IT'S OUR PRIVILEGE TO SHARE THIS YEAR'S ANNUAL REPORT, REFLECTING ON A SEASON FILLED WITH GROWTH, **CONNECTION, AND REMARKABLE ACHIEVEMENTS ACROSS THE TENNIS COMMUNITY IN AOTEAROA.**

From grassroots participation to international success, we've seen our sport flourish in ways that inspire pride and optimism for the future.

This report highlights key milestones—on and off the court and celebrates the collective efforts of our volunteers, members, partners, and staff who continue to shape the landscape of tennis in New Zealand.

GROWING THE GAME

Club membership continues its steady rise, reaching 44,437 members nationwide—a 3.3% increase. Notably, our U12 membership grew by 17%, a testament to the outstanding work of clubs and coaches delivering engaging, highquality programs for young players.

Casual participation also surged, with 33,663 players enjoying tennis at clubs, schools, and business leagues—a 6.8% increase.

Casual hiring through Book A Court was up 50% to contribute over \$627,000 into the tennis system, including \$138K to clubs, enabling reinvestment into facilities, programs, and outreach initiatives.

Our flagship community event, Love Tennis, welcomed over 17,000 participants across 143 clubs. With the support of more than 2,000 volunteers, clubs created welcoming, familyfriendly environments that generated 3,900 new members worth over \$750,000 in revenue.

The Youth Advisory Group continues to provide insights and understanding based on their strategy.

We have also continued to develop work in the Disability and Inclusion area, with the establishment of the Wheelchair Advisory Group and alongside Sport NZ, the ITF and Paralympics NZ created a D&I framework that outlines the key principles of our collective approach.

CONNECT KIA TŪHONO

We're proud to now have over 160,000 tennis players and fans connected to tennis through our national database—up from 90,000 last year representing nearly 3% of New Zealand's population. This is an asset for our whole tennis community with access through the regional portal for our members.

Our bicultural journey continues to deepen. With our cultural advisor role in place, we've developed a Māori Outcomes Framework and strengthened relationships with local iwi through pōwhiri at international events.

The ASB Classic continues to be a showcase for tennis, and in 2025 reached out to Auckland communities through Lulu Sun's visit to Sunnyhills Tennis Club and held a special event for over 200 Chinese-New Zealand children at Albany Tennis Centre. We also launched the inaugural ASB Classic E-Tennis Championship.

WIN KIA TOA

This year marked an historic achievement: our Billie Jean King Cup team, Captained by Matt Hair and spearheaded by Lulu Sun and Monique Barry alongside three debutantes Aishi Das, Sasha Situe and Renee Zhang, made NZ history by qualifying for the World Group Play-off for the first time in 32 years.

LULU SUN PLAYED A PIVOTAL ROLE, GOING UNDEFEATED THROUGH THE TIE. EARLIER IN THE YEAR ANOTHER HISTORIC ACHIEVEMENT WAS REACHED WITH LULU MAKING THE WIMBLEDON QUARTER-FINALS AND THE MONTERREY 500 FINAL BEFORE INJURY AT THE US OPEN.

Erin Routliffe and her partner Gabby Dabrowski had another strong year culminating in the WTA Finals Doubles title, making history with women's doubles prize money over \$1m USD.

History was also made for New Zealand when Lulu and Erin paired up to be the first women's doubles duo to compete at the Olympic Games in Paris. Para-Standing Tennis athlete Alex Hunt retained his World Champion title, winning both singles and doubles in Barcelona in June 2025, adding to Alex's Oceania Championship win in January this year.

OUR DAVIS CUP TEAM HELD THEIR POSITION IN GROUP II IN AN AWAY TIE HELD IN JAMAICA. WE COMMEND CAPTAINS OF BOTH TEAMS, ARTEM SITAK AND MATT HAIR, ALONG WITH MEN'S COACH CLINT PACKER, FOR THEIR LEADERSHIP AND SUCCESS THROUGHOUT THE YEAR.

Doubles duo James Watt and Finn Reynolds have made significant progress since teaming up and continue to climb the rankings.

They follow in the footsteps of Michael Venus, who has been a consistent performer and remains a mainstay in the ATP doubles top 20.

Our NZ junior teams continue to have success as well, shining at the Australian Teams Event, with four of six teams reaching the semi-finals, the best performance since our inclusion at this event.

With regional support, the World Tennis Tour (WTT) pro-tour footprint expanded with WTT events in Pāpāmoa, Wellington, and the inaugural Timaru WTT tournament. Held in partnership with Tennis South Canterbury, this event saw over 4,000 fans attend. Across five professional tournaments, 50 Kiwi players competed, with 26 reaching main draw matches.

ENABLE KIA EKE **MODERNISING TENNIS**

This year brought transformative change with the adoption of the new Tennis NZ Constitution. Through an enormous collective effort with our National Governance Forum members, we've laid the groundwork for a future-ready, communitydriven sport.

Key developments include:

- · A restructured membership model with clear roles for Regional Tennis Organisations and Local Tennis Partners to grow the game through our club network.
- · A digitally connected tennis system for improved insights, automation and communication.
- Enhanced participant protection through national policy reach, enabled by non-voting membership classes for all players (including casuals) and parents.
- Modernised constitution templates for all organisations in our tennis system.

We acknowledge the ongoing efforts of all tennis organisations to re-register under the 2022 Incorporated Societies Act ahead of the deadline of April 2026.

The rollout of MatchPoint, the new competition platform for tennis in New Zealand is in full swing after a successful winter pilot in the Auckland and Northern Regions. The transition to the World Tennis Number (WTN) is also modernising our ranking system and should bring further benefits to players in future years.

Our SAFE Tennis system continues to grow, with automated Police Vetting and a Coach Register now integrated into our database, with over 450 coaches registered.

Over 370 club volunteers joined webinars on digital capability, youth engagement, and governance—reflecting a strong appetite for learning and leadership.

ASB CLASSIC

The 2025 ASB Classic exceeded all expectations, with 93,000 attendees and 2.9 million broadcast viewer hours.

Tournament Director Nicolas Lamperin ensured the playing field was again strong and his team, alongside a dedicated volunteer crew, delivered an unforgettable event.

We thank all commercial partners, especially ASB, for their unwavering support.



FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Despite many successes, this year presented financial challenges.

Tennis NZ recorded a deficit, primarily due to a decline in TAB revenue. While budget expenditure was reduced 20%, a shortfall remained.

We continue to explore sustainable solutions to strengthen our financial position.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

We wish to acknowledge Glenn Black for serving as Tennis NZ Honorary Vice President in 2025, in recognition of his enormous service to tennis.

Te Tohu Hāpai Lifetime Service Honours were conferred on seven others for their decades of volunteer work bringing regional and national impact.

We extend heartfelt thanks to our volunteer Board members. In 2024 we said farewell to Marina Erakovic as she took maternity leave for her first child, a baby girl.

Olympian Sarah Cowley Ross joined in her place. We also wish to acknowledge the service of coopted Board member Dee Isaacs who leaves in 2025 ahead of the inaugural appointment of a formal Māori Board Member role.

To our staff, especially during the busy summer season—thank you for your dedication. We bid farewell to National Coach Chris Bint, and Tournaments and Events Manager Mark Atkins, and wish them well in their next chapters.

Above all, we thank our volunteers, players, coaches, partners, and supporters. Your passion and commitment continue to elevate tennis in New Zealand, and we look forward to building on this momentum together.

OVER THE PAST 12 MONTHS, TENNIS IN AOTEAROA HAS CONTINUED TO THRIVE, POWERED BY THE PASSION. **COMMITMENT AND SHEER HARD WORK** OF OUR LOCAL VOLUNTEERS, CLUB **MANAGERS, COACHES** AND SUPPORTERS.

From grassroots to governance, the tennis community has shown what's possible when people come together with a shared love for the game.

This year, we've seen continued growth in both club membership and casual participation, a renewed energy in youth engagement, and a collective effort to navigate the changes brought about by the Incorporated Societies Act 2022 and the Modernising Tennis Plan.

Clubs across the motu have stepped up by modernising systems, welcoming new players, and creating vibrant, inclusive spaces for everyone to enjoy tennis.

As we look ahead to another full summer of tennis, we do so with gratitude, optimism, and a deep appreciation for the people who make it all happen.

With over 2400 volunteers regularly supporting club operations and an average of 30% of members under 12, the future of our sport is in great hands. While challenges remain, particularly around coach availability and digital capability, the momentum is undeniable.

This year has been about more than just participation, it's been about progress. We've seen clubs embrace change, adapt to new systems, and lean towards the opportunities presented by the Modernising Tennis Plan and the Incorporated Societies Act 2022.

In our Club Health Indicator Survey, over 70% of clubs reported they are actively working through the re-registration process, with many already well on their way.

CLUB MEMBERSHIP: A COMMUNITY ON THE RISE

Club membership continues to grow steadily, with 44,437 members registered across the country, up from 43,034 last year. That's a 3.3% increase, and it's a direct reflection of the incredible work being done at the local level.

From the far north to the deep south, clubs are creating welcoming, flexible, and fun environments that cater to all ages and stages.

THE BIGGEST GROWTH THIS YEAR CAME FROM OUR U18 AGE GROUPS, A PROMISING SIGN THAT OUR SPORT IS **CONNECTING WITH BOTH TAMARIKI AND** RANGATAHI REDISCOVERING TENNIS OR TRYING IT FOR THE FIRST TIME.

This growth is no accident. It's the result of:

- Innovative membership offerings tailored to modern lifestyles.
- Strong local leadership from club committees and managers.
- A culture of inclusion and accessibility that welcomes everyone.

With nearly one in four members under the age of 12, the future of tennis in Aotearoa is bright, and it's being built from the grassroots up.

CASUAL PARTICIPATION: FLEXIBILITY FUELS GROWTH

Casual participation has shown strong growth again this year, with 33,663 casual players engaging with tennis through clubs, centres, schools, and business house leagues (up from 31,521 last year.) That's a 6.8% increase,

continuing a multi-year trend of growth in flexible, non-traditional formats.

Tools like Book A Court and flexible club offerings, are making it easier than ever for people to play when and how they want. Clubs are embracing this shift, offering more drop-in sessions, social leagues, and digital booking options that meet people where they are.

This growth matters not just for participation, but for sustainability. Casual players contributed over \$600,000 in court hire revenue last year, helping clubs reinvest in facilities, programmes, and community outreach.

NATIONAL PROGRAMMES: WORLD-CLASS, COMMUNITY-FOCUSED

Our national programmes continue to provide experiences that set the standard not just in tennis, but across all sports in Aotearoa.

This year, over 47,000 participants engaged with these programmes either through Tennis Hot Shots, Cardio Tennis, or Tennis Xpress; a strong indicator of the programmes' reach and relevance.

We saw a 17% increase in our U12 membership numbers this year, which shows the value that participants are putting on quality programmes being delivered by quality coaches.

This year saw a renewed focus on Cardio Tennis, a programme designed to get people active, learning, with high energy and fun environments. Supporting the new rollout was a dedicated activation at the 2025 ASB Classic in January. All combined, we've seen Cardio participation increase 48% this year.



The refreshed branding and delivery (developed in partnership with Tennis Australia) has helped these programmes appeal to a broader audience while staying true to their core philosophies. Coaches and deliverers have embraced the changes, and the results speak for themselves.

These programmes are more than just participation tools. They're community builders, confidence boosters, and gateways to a lifelong love of tennis.

MODERNISING TENNIS PLAN: BUILDING A FUTURE-READY SPORT

The changes brought about by the Incorporated Societies Act 2022 have been significant. Our tennis community has responded with resilience, collaboration and a shared commitment to progress.

The Modernising Tennis Plan is about more than compliance, it's about creating a sport that's easier to manage, safer to participate in, and better connected.

The four changes, developed through consultation with Regions and Associations, are;

- Create clearer support and delivery of the sport through a restructure of membership into Regional Tennis Organisations (RTOs) and Local Tennis Partners (LTPs) with clear roles and responsibilities to grow the game through our club network.
- A digitally connected network of clubs to the national database for better insights. automation, and compliance.
- Expanded participant protection by introducing non-voting membership classes for casual players and aligning policies across all tennis bodies.
- Dated constitution templates for RTOs and clubs to use, ensuring compliance, best practice, and future proofing.

Support continues to be rolled out to help clubs transition smoothly, with templates, webinars, and one-on-one guidance available.

The April 2026 deadline is approaching, but the spirit of collaboration and shared purpose is strong.

This is a big moment for tennis in New Zealand, and together, we're rising to meet it.

CLUB HEALTH INDICATOR SURVEY: LISTENING, LEARNING, LEADING

This year, Tennis NZ launched the Club Health Indicator Survey, a nationwide initiative designed to better understand the realities, challenges, and strengths of our clubs. The goal was to listen, learn, and lead with insight to shape the future direction and tailor the support we provide clubs in New Zealand.

We asked clubs to reflect on key areas of their operations, including:

- Governance and leadership
- Volunteerism
- Digital systems
- Facilities and accessibility
- Youth engagement
- Coach development
- Communication
- Constitution changes

What We Learned:

• Volunteers remain the backbone of our sport, with clubs reporting an average of 7.3 volunteers outside of their committees actively supporting operations.

- Governance practices vary widely, with many clubs seeking more support around onboarding, role clarity and succession planning.
- Digital adoption is growing, but uneven. While 66% of clubs use Clubspark, others still rely on manual systems or need help transitioning.
- Youth engagement is strong, with nearly one in four members under 12, but only 15% of clubs currently have a youth representative supporting the decision making.
- Coach availability is a challenge, with 25% of clubs reporting a shortfall in coaching hours, averaging eight hours per week. This is felt harder in more rural areas.
- Facilities are generally well maintained, but many clubs flagged the need for upgrades within the next five years.
- Communication preferences are shifting, with clubs valuing concise, relevant updates and more opportunities for peer learning and networking.

This survey has given us a clearer picture of where support is most needed, and where

innovation is already happening. It's helping shape our priorities for the year ahead, from digital capability building to volunteer development, youth strategies and coach recruitment and development.

Most importantly, it's reaffirmed what we already knew: our clubs are full of passionate, committed people doing amazing work.

CLUB SUPPORT: EMPOWERING THE HEART OF TENNIS

Clubs are the beating heart of tennis in Aotearoa, and supporting them is central to what we do. This year, Tennis NZ continued to invest in tools, resources, and relationships that help clubs deliver quality, accessible experiences to their communities. Here's what we delivered to support Clubs and RTOs:

National Participation Team Hui in place of Club Hui 28th & 29th August 2024

- 19 attendees, 15 regions/associations in attendance.
- · Five topics, feedback collectively showed 80% satisfaction.

The annual Love Tennis campaign was once again a highlight, with 143 clubs participating in September 2024.

It's more than an open day, it's a national celebration of tennis, and a powerful way for clubs to connect with their communities.

Key highlights from this year's campaigns:

- Backed by contracted 'Champions' providing direct regional support for Love Tennis.
- A strong result from the Love Tennis social media marketing campaign, with 21,295 link clicks, 478,802 reach and 2,035,231 total impressions nationwide.
- Club attendance increased 22% from last year, averaging 119 participants per club.
- A team of 2,054 volunteers nationwide.



COACH DEVELOPMENT: BUILDING CAPABILITY. CREATING IMPACT

Coaches play a pivotal role in shaping the tennis experience. This year, Tennis NZ continued to invest in their development, recognition and support.

We delivered:

- 71 coach education opportunities from courses, webinars, and our annual coach conference.
- 25 performance-focused coach development engagements – touring, camps, connections and upskilling.
- Continued growth of the National Coach Register, now with over 450 coaches showing the value of being qualified and registered and that coaches are committed to showing their professionalism.

The Club Health Indicator Survey reinforced what we already know:

- Coach availability is a challenge.
- Many clubs continue to use volunteer or parent coaches.
- · Clubs value clear communication and collaboration with their coaches.

We're proud of the progress, but we know there's more to do. Our focus moving forward is on:

- Expanding access to entry-level coaching pathways.
- Supporting coaches to grow their businesses and impact.
- Ensuring every coach, paid or volunteer, feels valued, equipped, and connected.

MODERNISING TENNIS: A SYSTEM TRANSFORMED

The past year has seen one of the most significant transformations for tennis in Aotearoa. With the adoption of the new Tennis NZ Constitution in December 2024, we've laid the foundation for a sport that's future-ready, community-driven, and built for growth.

This wasn't just a policy update. It was the result of collaborative, nationwide consultation with Regional Tennis Organisations (RTOs), Local Tennis Partners (LTPs), and club leaders.

Together, we've reshaped the way tennis is delivered, governed, and experienced.

1. A New Constitution: The Cornerstone of Change

The new Tennis NZ Constitution is more than a legal document, it's a strategic blueprint for the future of our sport. Developed through extensive consultation, it reflects the shared values and aspirations of our tennis community.

Benefits to clubs and communities:

- Provides clarity and confidence in how the sport is governed.
- Aligns national and regional priorities for stronger collaboration.
- Sets a clear direction for growth, inclusion, and sustainability.

2. A New Structure for Delivery

The introduction of RTOs and LTPs has created a more connected and consistent delivery model across the country. Clubs now have clearer pathways to support, and Tennis NZ has a direct line to the grassroots.

Benefits to clubs and communities:

- Easier access to resources, guidance and funding.
- More consistent support regardless of location or size.
- Stronger regional representation in national decision-making.

3. Digital Connectivity: Joining the Tennis **Ecosystem**

Over 150 clubs are now connected to the national database, enabling smarter communication, better data insights, and easier compliance.

Tools like Clubspark and Book A Court are helping clubs streamline operations and engage participants more effectively.

Benefits to clubs and communities:

- Simplified membership management and reporting.
- Better data to support funding applications and planning.
- Seamless integration with national campaigns and programmes.

4. Systemwide Membership: Protection and **Belonging**

Every participant, whether a club member, casual player, or tournament entrant, is now part of a systemwide membership model.

This ensures that everyone is covered by shared policies, safeguarding standards, and a unified Code of Conduct.

Benefits to clubs and communities:

- Ensures policy consistency across all levels of the sport.

Every club now has access to a ready-to-use constitution template that aligns with the Incorporated Societies Act 2022 and the Modernising Tennis Plan. These documents are designed to be simple, compliant and future-proof.

- · Supports succession planning and committee onboarding.


None of this could have been possible without the incredible mahi of our club volunteers. regional leaders, and the Tennis NZ Board and staff.

OFFICIALS

The 2024-2025 year has been busy in the New Zealand officiating space. This is the first full year that officiating has been under the Tennis NZ banner.

Bronwyn Northgrave, Officials Coordinator continues to work 10 hours a week. Bronwyn has been instrumental in the increase in the number of officials throughout the country, facilitating courses and development opportunities and we thank her for her time and effort.

Mark Atkins, Tournaments and Events Manager has worked closely with Bronwyn to drive the Officials Pathway.

Over the past 12 months there have been six Court Supervisor Courses, two Referee Courses, one Chair Umpire Course and three Line Umpire Courses. The mixture of online and in-person courses allowed people across NZ to sign up, attend and do their shadow day locally. Tennis NZ Officials also offered Assistant Referee development opportunities at the Junior ITF tournaments in September/October 2024.

Thank you to our course facilitators – Christine McKnight, Melissa Rigby, Matthew Burrell, Pat O'Rourke, Tony Brosnahan, and Ching Evans.

Our impact with these courses has been noticeable this year, thanks to our great team of facilitators. Ahmad Abdul-Rahman was selected for the Level 2 School in Hong Kong in April 2025 where he successfully gained his White Badge Referee certification.

Luis Silva and Georges Von Der Decken were selected to attend the Chair Umpire Academy in Melbourne in December 2024. The three-day course allowed them to train with top international Chair Umpires and then they had the opportunity to officiate at the World Tennis Tour events in NZ.

Ayoub Ahmad was selected for a development spot to Chair Umpire in Guam and Asia in June 2025. We continue to have several officials working internationally, Dimitar Trifunovski works full-time as a Review Official. Melissa Rigby (Bronze Badge) officiated at Grand Slams and WTT events as a Line Umpire and Chair Umpire respectively.

Christine McKnight was selected as Chief Umpire at the Brisbane International and Hobart International, Assistant Chief at the 2025 Australian Open and the NZ v Luxembourg Davis Cup Tie.

Tennis NZ hosted a Davis Cup Tie in Palmerston North in September 2024, the World Tennis Tour (WTT) events in December 2024 and a new WTT event in Timaru in February 2025.

These events have been crucial for our officials gaining much needed international event experience in New Zealand.

At the 2025 ASB Classic, electric line calling (ELC) was used for the first time. Line Umpire positions are now Match Assistants.

At this event, Hamish Masters gained his Bolt6 Review Official Certification and Melissa Rigby Chair Umpired at both the WTA and ATP events.

Tennis NZ would like to thank Christine McKnight and Sandie Newton for being part of the interim Selection Panel with the merge between NZTUA and Tennis NZ.

Last, but not least, Tennis NZ would like to thank all our officials throughout the country for their time and effort. They are very key part in all our events that we run.

WHEELCHAIR TENNIS

2025 marks the first year that Tennis NZ has taken on the governing responsibilities for New Zealand Wheelchair Tennis (NZWT). Previously, NZWT was run entirely by a passionate volunteer team, so integrating it into Tennis NZ's existing framework builds on their work and helps ensure a sustainable future for wheelchair tennis.

As part of this integration, a Wheelchair Advisory Group was established to maintain the connection to those core volunteers and ensure Tennis NZ was accessing their expertise and knowledge. To help shape the direction and future growth in this space, Tennis NZ – with support from Sport NZ, the ITF and Paralympics NZ, have created a Disability and Inclusion Framework that outlines the key principles of our approach as we begin this journey.

In September 2024, several New Zealand players competed in Australia at the New South Wales Wheelchair Open and the Canberra Wheelchair Open, gaining valuable experience against some of the world's best players. Four New Zealanders played in the New South Wales event, with Brendan Mes and Travis Moffat both reaching the quarter-finals.

A WHEELCHAIR ADVISORY GROUP WAS **ESTABLISHED TO MAINTAIN THE CONNECTION TO THOSE CORE VOLUNTEERS AND ENSURE TENNIS NZ** WAS ACCESSING THEIR EXPERTISE AND KNOWLEDGE.

For the second year running, the NZ National Wheelchair Championships were held alongside the EVES Open in Pāpāmoa. Building on the positive feedback from the inaugural event, players enjoyed a high-performance environment with sunny weather and full courts.

The final was played on the EVES Open singles finals day, drawing a healthy crowd on centre court. Third seed Glenn Barnes claimed the title with a win over Brendan Mes.

Alongside the national championships in Pāpāmoa, Tennis NZ organised a wheelchair tennis participation activation to encourage people to give the sport a try.

Experienced players were on hand to assist, and it was fantastic to see smiles on faces as participants experienced the thrill of wheelchair tennis for the first time.

BLIND/LOW VISION TENNIS

Alternative tennis formats have enjoyed increased recognition, with significant media coverage over the past year.

In the Blind/Low Vision space, Lissie Cleave represented New Zealand at the Blind/Low Vision World Championships in Italy, with her journey featured on 1News.

Tennis NZ launched a dedicated Blind/Low Vision webpage, complete with an accessibility menu, to help people learn more about the format and find specific classes around the country.

One of these classes is run by Greg Lim at Ngatira Tennis Club, who was featured on Seven Sharp as an "ASB Good As Gold" recipient. He received a \$10,000 grant to continue supporting his programme.

PARA-STANDING TENNIS

The International Tennis Federation (ITF) has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the International Para-Standing Tennis and Padel Association to strengthen collaboration in developing para-standing tennis. This marks a significant commitment by the ITF to support the growth of the format.

New Zealand's Alex Hunt maintained his position as the world's top-ranked Para-Standing PST1 player, successfully defending both his Oceania singles title in Melbourne and his World Championship singles title in Barcelona.

He also won the World Championship PST1-2 doubles title alongside Adam Hills of Australia. Alex continues to be an exceptional role model, inspiring the next generation of para-athletes.


CONNECTING NEW AND DIVERSE COMMUNITIES TO TENNIS

Tennis NZ continues to expand our reach and presence through increased marketing and event activity, along with growth of our national database. This work enables us to connect with new communities, and to grow the profile of the sport.

Highlights from the year included:

- The launch of World Tennis Tour: Timaru, with over 4000 fans attending the event at Trust Aoraki Tennis Centre, including a sold out finals day – and universal praise from players, spectators and stakeholders.
- The ASB Classic broke records for the second year in a row for the number of attendees, event revenue and engagement. Key stats include: 93,000 people in attendance, 2.9 million broadcast viewer hours on SKY, global broadcast viewership of 14.3 million and 25% growth in social media engagement.
- Tennis NZ social media reached more than 1 million people in early July, celebrating Lulu Sun's historic success at Wimbledon 2024.

- ASB Classic community engagements and enhancements included Lulu Sun visiting Sunnyhills Tennis Club in East Auckland to hit with local junior players and attending a special event for more than 200 Chinese-New Zealand children at Albany Tennis Centre, where coaching, instruction and a Q&A with Lulu were offered in a multi-lingual setting.
- We also introduced the first ASB Classic E-Tennis Championship, with the final being played in The Serve, and our winner Mana Ormsby earning a trip to the Australian Open for the AO E-Sports Championship as our NZ representative.
- More than 17,000 Kiwis took part in a Love Tennis event at one of 143 tennis clubs. Love Tennis is powered by volunteers, and more than 2000 volunteers helped create inviting, family friendly environments at their clubs. This event returned more than \$750,000 in new membership revenue to clubs across NZ.
- More than 370 club volunteers signed up for club support webinars, with topics including digital capability, volunteer recruitment and retention, club constitution support and supporting youth voice in clubs.

ENABLING GROWTH WITH ACCESS TO SYSTEMS, TOOLS AND FACILITIES

By providing world-class systems, we enable the tennis community to stay connected, and advance objectives including participation growth, elite performance and top quality events and facilities.

Highlights for the year included:

• Our national tennis database more than doubled, with over 160,000 Kiwis now connected to tennis - over 3% of the population. Strong growth on online membership management within clubs fuelled this increase, work that continues with new membership management providers becoming approved providers alongside Clubspark.

- Clubspark court booking systems generated \$627,000 in revenue across 65 venues including clubs and facilities, with club revenue totalling \$138,000. A new low-cost smart padlock option has significantly lowered cost for clubs to engage with online court booking and increase their revenue and court usage.
- Our High Performance systems continue to evolve, with new camps and playing opportunities supporting player performance across the year. Players from high performance squads and teams were frequent visitors to Tennis NZ's national office at Albany Tennis Centre, providing a base for growing a high-performance culture.
- Utilisation of other key venues, such as the Red Clay Tennis facility in Wairarapa for camps and match-play have exposed young players to important new environments for their growth and development.

A YEAR OF HISTORIC FIRSTS FOR NEW ZEALAND TENNIS. **PARTICULARLY IN THE WOMEN'S GAME.**

In July, Lulu Sun became the first Kiwi to reach the Wimbledon quarter-finals, before teaming up with Erin Routliffe to form the first New Zealand women's doubles pair to compete at the Olympic Games in Paris.

ROUTLIFFE WENT ON TO CAPTURE ANOTHER MILESTONE, BECOMING THE FIRST NEW ZEALANDER TO WIN THE WTA FINALS ALONGSIDE PARTNER **GABY DABROWSKI.**

Adding to the success, the Billie Jean King Cup team secured promotion from Group I, advancing to the World Group Play-Offs for the first time in this version of the event.

The start of 2025 also marked the retirement of two Davis Cup stalwarts, Marcus Daniell and Rubin Statham, who each enjoyed professional careers spanning nearly 20 years and made invaluable contributions to New Zealand tennis.

On the staffing front, we farewelled Chris Bint, who moved on to the WTA Tour after two years of outstanding service and welcomed Clint Packer and Matt Hair as lead coaches for the newly launched Professional Player Support Programme.

Together, they provided players with more than 20 weeks of on-tour coaching support in its first year.

Across the wider High Performance (HP) Programme, 40 players received coaching support on Tennis NZ-led international tours, with many more supported at domestic junior and professional events. An additional 45 athletes represented New Zealand in international team competitions across all age groups.

To further strengthen development pathways, the HP team delivered nine national camps for U12-U16 players, bringing together the country's best juniors to train and compete.

The Wellbeing Programme also completed its inaugural year, offering eligible players three individual sessions, as well as tailored support for professional players at the ASB Classic and during senior team home ties.

BILLIE JEAN KING CUP

Captain Matt Hair, and his team spearheaded by Lulu Sun and Monique Barry, alongside three debutantes Aishi Das, Sasha Situe and Renee Zhang, made NZ history winning the Group I tie in Pune, India in April 2025.

The team progress to the World Group Playoff stage for the first time in over thirty years, where they will compete against Poland and Romania for a spot in the World Group Qualifying stage in 2026.

DAVIS CUP

This year saw the New Zealand Davis Cup team compete in Palmerston North in September 2024 against a strong Luxembourg team.

Newly appointed Davis Cup Captain, Artem Sitak, led the team consisting of debutant Jack Loutit alongside Ajeet Rai, Finn Reynolds, KP Pannu and Rubin Statham who played the deciding rubber for the tie, competing in his final appearance 19 years after his first.

The team narrowly lost 3-2 but it was a tightly fought battle that went to the wire.

Following this, the team were able to turn the tables and win against Jamaica 3-2 in February 2025. The team was Finn Reynolds, Ajeet Rai, Jack Loutit. KP Pannu and debutant Alexander Klintcharov.

Outstanding singles performances by Jack Loutit and a solid doubles performance by Finn Reynolds and Ajeet Rai clinched the tie.

PLAYER PROFILES



ERIN ROUTLIFFE

Another successful year for Erin saw her secure her position in the WTA top 10 for another year. Erin started 24/25 year with a win at the Cincinnati Open WTA 1000 event with friend Asia Muhammad and gained a WTA 500 title with Jelena Ostapenko in Charleston. With her usual partner Gaby Dabrowski, they won both Stuttgart and most impressively won the WTA Finals in Riyadh. This is the first time a kiwi player has achieved this feat since its initiation in 1972.



LULU SUN

After her breakthrough success at the 2024 Wimbledon Championships, Lulu made her Olympic debut in Paris with Erin Routliffe, and went on to make her first WTA singles final at the WTA 500 in Monterrey, Mexico. Following a break for injury at the US Open, Lulu returned to the tour, to build on last year's amazing progress. Lulu went undefeated at the Billie Jean King Cup and was instrumental in the team's win.



MONIQUE BARRY

Monique has had a very successful year of doubles results winning W35 tournaments in Launceston and Burnie, W15 tournaments in Wellington and Thailand, in addition two other finals bringing her ranking to career high of #261. She also reached her singles career high of #471 and secured some key wins in the Billie Jean King Cup to help the team top their group.



VALENTINA IVANOV

In the 23/24 season Valentina finished her college career with a college ranking high of #38 in singles and #45 in doubles. From May 2024 Valentina has been committed to playing professional tennis and progressing her ranking. In 24/25 Valentina won three W15 doubles titles, two in Serbia and a third in Poland.





VIVIAN YANG

In 24/25 Vivian completed her sophomore year at college reaching a college ranking high of #61 in singles and #7 in doubles in December 2024. Vivian won the ASB Classic Wildcard Play-off and competed in the main draw against top 100 ranked Jodie Burrage. Vivian returned to Pepperdine to finish the year before transferring to University of Virginia for 25/26 season. In the college break she competed in several events and won a W15 title in Maanshan, China.

ELYSE TSE

Elyse Tse graduated from college and began full time on tour in May 2025 and is focused on progressing her professional ranking. She has seen early success in doubles, making the finals of the W35 in Tauranga and two finals in W15 tournaments in Tunisia.



AJEET RAI

Ajeet won three ITF doubles titles this year including the M15 in Wellington where he also took the singles title, as well as two M25 titles in Yinchuan, China and Swan Hill, Australia. Ajeet also made five other ITF M25 doubles finals. Ajeet represented NZ against Luxembourg and Jamaica in the Davis Cup, securing wins in doubles with Finn Reynolds.



FINN REYNOLDS

Finn has had another great year on the doubles tour. He started 24/25 strongly at ATP Challenger 50s winning Bogota and was a finalist in Manzanillo. He then won an M15 in Huntsville before teaming up with fellow kiwi James Watt. James and Finn have gone from strength to strength, making finals of Cuernavaca, and the Ostrava Challenger 75, before taking their first title together in Tyler, USA. They backed this up with two more Challenger 75 wins in Cary, USA and Granby, Canada, taking his ranking to a career high of #125.







MICHAEL VENUS

Michael has maintained another year in the top 30 doubles list, currently ranked #25. Despite a couple of partner changes, Mike still made two ATP 500 finals at Queen's and Vienna, as well as winning the Auckland ASB Classic 250 title in his first tournament with Nikola Metkic.

JAMES WATT

James has had a breakout year on the doubles tour. Starting 24/25 with a ranking of #601, James won five ITF M25 titles with Australian partner Matt Hulme in Mildura, Burnie, Carins and two in Darwin, as well as making the final of the Brisbane (2) Challenger 75 taking him to #301. In March 2025, James partnered with Finn Reynolds, winning three Challenger 75 titles in Tyler and Cary in the USA and Granby in Canada, as well as reaching two finals in Ostrava and Cuernavaca taking him to career high of #126. James has also made good progress on the singles tour, making the final of the ITF M25 in Darwin, before successfully getting through qualifying of three challengers to the main draw in Granby, Tunisia and San Luis Potosi. At a 4th Challenger in Newport, having narrowly lost in the second round of qualifying, James made the most of a lucky loser spot to make it through to the quarter-finals, progressing to a career high #580.

JACK LOUTIT

In September 2024, Jack made his Davis Cup debut and pulled out a thrilling win against the Luxembourg #1 to bring the tie into a deciding rubber. Jack was also pivotal in his second Davis Cup tie winning both his singles rubbers in Jamaica aiding the team to an overall win.



ALEX KLINTCHAROV

In 2024, Alex won his first two ITF doubles titles the M25 Tianjin and M15 in Pāpāmoa with fellow kiwi Corban Crowther. In 2025 Alex gained some solid singles results leading to a career high of #730 in May 2025. Alex also received his first nomination for Davis Cup in February 2025 against Jamaica.



KIRANPAL PANNU

Kiranpal reached a career high of #437 in October 2024 and played at the ASB Classic in the doubles with Ajeet Rai. Kiranpal was also selected to play in both Davis Cup ties in 24/25 in Palmerston North and Jamaica.



CORBAN CROWTHER

Corban reached his career high of #845 in October 2024 and took the doubles title in his hometown event the M15 in Pāpāmoa with kiwi partner Alex Klintcharov.



ISAAC BECROFT

Isaac earnt 2025's main draw wildcard for the ASB Classic by winning the Wildcard Playoff in Te Anau, leading to a competitive match against Zizou Bergs going down 3-6, 5-7. In May 2025, professional tour.



MATT SHEARER

Matt completed his senior year of college at William Carey University in 24/25 and in the off season picked up his first pro doubles title at M25 Wichita, and made another final at the M15 in Huntsville.



HARRY PUGH

Harry completed his first year as a freshman at college at Lander University and won the Peach Belt Conference Freshman of the Year. In the college break over NZ summer, Harry also achieved his first ATP ranking at the NZ events.



ANTON SHEPP

Anton completed his college career at the University of Nebraska and started competing on the professional tour in May 2025. Since then, he has already secured two M15 doubles titles in Bastad and Ystad, building on the M15 Wellington doubles final he made in December 2024.



REECE FALCK

Reece has just completed his first full year on tour and made the doubles final of the W15 in Huntsville and reached a career high #1283 singles and #949 doubles.



2025 RETIREMENTS

MARCUS DANIELL

This year saw Marcus make his official retirement from professional tennis at the 2025 ASB Classic.

A career featuring a ranking high of #34 in doubles, five ATP titles and an Olympic bronze medal in Tokyo, as well as representing NZ at two Olympics and 19 Davis Cup ties.

It was awesome to see Marcus closing out his illustrious tennis career at his home tournament in front of his wife and family, including his young son Rowan.

As a former Olympian, Marcus has now completed his first year as an elected member of the IOC Athletes' Commission representing athlete voices from all sports at the highest level, in addition to running his not-for-profit charity organisation High Impact Athletes.

RUBIN STATHAM

2024 was Rubin's final year on tour, retiring at the start of 2025.

In his penultimate tournament he made the final of the Matsuyama Challenger 75. 2024 also saw Rubin's final Davis Cup appearance nearly 20 years after his first, an amazing achievement. Rubin was nominated for 38 ties, playing in 35 of them.

Rubin won 12 ITF singles titles and 24 ITF doubles titles across his 19-year professional career.

Tennis NZ has undertaken a comprehensive bicultural transformation, systematically integrating te ao Māori principles throughout its operations to honor Te Tiriti o Waitangi commitments and embrace indigenous cultural values.

Tennis NZ Board Chair Terri-Ann Scorer has exemplified exceptional cultural leadership through her personal te reo Māori journey.

She consistently opens all meetings with mihi, establishing respectful cultural foundations in formal proceedings and normalising te reo Māori in business contexts.

Her authentic commitment extends to active participation in Aotearoa Māori tennis competitions across Rotorua, Waikato, and Tauranga regions, where she takes speaking roles during pōwhiri ceremonies, building genuine relationships with Māori tennis communities.

COMPREHENSIVE **ORGANISATIONAL** DEVELOPMENT

The organisation implemented foundational treaty training facilitated by Jim Mathers, equipping staff and leadership with essential knowledge about Te Tiriti o Waitangi and its organisational implications.

This was complemented by extensive cultural education covering multiple te ao Māori aspects:

- Pepeha: Understanding connections to place and identity
- Whakapapa: Appreciating genealogical relationships
- Te Whakahua kupu / Pronunciation: Developing te reo Māori accuracy

This holistic approach ensures staff develop both linguistic skills and deeper cultural appreciation, moving beyond surface-level engagement.

CULTURAL PROTOCOL INTEGRATION

Tennis NZ has meaningfully integrated tikanga Māori into formal events, opening Annual General Meetings with karakia to establish spiritual and cultural foundations for organisational discussions. The Tennis NZ Awards similarly incorporate these elements, honoring achievements while respecting Māori cultural values.

A standout accomplishment has been implementing powhiri for international Davis Cup events from 2023-2025. Visiting teams were welcomed through traditional Māori protocols. In Waihōpai, Thailand were welcomed by mana whenua Ngāi Tahu and Te Wharekura o Arowhenua, and in Manawatū, Luxembourg were welcomed by Rangitane.

This initiative demonstrates genuine New Zealand bicultural hospitality on the international stage, positioning the country as a leader in culturally inclusive sporting practices.

AUTHENTIC PARTNERSHIP

The organisation's approach transcends ceremonial inclusion, representing systematic transformation encompassing leadership development, staff education, community development and protocol integration.

The collaboration with mana whenua for international events and the Chairman's active participation in Māori tennis communities indicates authentic relationship-building rather than tokenistic gestures.

ORGANISATIONAL IMPACT

This comprehensive tikanga-rua journey positions Tennis NZ as a bicultural sporting governance leader, creating a replicable model for other sporting organisations seeking to honor Te Tiriti commitments while maintaining operational excellence.

The systematic approach demonstrates how cultural integration can enhance rather than complicate organisational effectiveness.

FUTURE FOUNDATION

The documented initiatives establish strong practices across all operational levels, ensuring the tikanga-rua journey continues to evolve and deepen over time.

This transformation represents a genuine commitment to bicultural principles that strengthens both organisational identity and community relationships while showcasing New Zealand's unique cultural heritage internationally.

GOVERNANCE REPORT

The past year has required intensive focus from the tennis governance community on constitutional change.

Huge thanks go out to the National Governance Forum that was meeting on a weekly basis throughout the second half of 2024 to work through the changes required by the Incorporated Societies Act 2022 as well as those intended to modernise and strengthen the tennis system.

The modernised constitutional framework was passed in December 2024 and a set of templates followed to assist the tennis community. Tennis NZ welcomes the now 18 Regional Tennis Organisations (RTOs) as direct members and we acknowledge the ongoing effort to support Local Tennis Partners and clubs ahead of the April 2026 statutory deadline.

Setting up the new structure for success has been overseen by the Transition Steering Group as a joint effort between the Tennis NZ Board and National Governance Forum. The Steering Group, established in January 2025, has oversight of the steps RTOs are taking and support in place from Tennis NZ and peers.

The Tennis NZ New to Governance Programme in 2025 welcomed participation from new RTOs including Waikato Thames Valley, Hutt Valley, South Canterbury and Southland.

Alongside the new constitutions, the Tennis NZ Board has also issued a new Governance Regulation and National Data and Systems Regulation. These will be reviewed in 12 months to ensure the new system is working smoothly.

Another governance priority for 2024/2025 has been the programme to modernise competition and grading technology. The retirement of 'MatchHub' is a process of saying farewell to an old friend. Oversight of the processes to select and roll out new 'MatchPoint' software, as well as to integrate the ITF World Tennis Number, has included a set of Board stage-gate decisions to provide confidence that risks are being managed and stakeholders involved in testing and roll-out planning.

During the past year the Board has also overseen a refresh of the Tennis NZ values and revamping the Tennis Participant Protection Regulation for consultation, incorporating Child Protection policy work.

The Board's Health and Safety focus has resulted in development of a separate Health and Safety Risk Register for Tennis NZ as well as the introduction of an athlete Wellbeing Framework.

The Board's commitment to Tennis NZ's bicultural journey, Tikanga Rua, has continued through education sessions led by co-opted Board member Dee Isaacs. The Board has refreshed our 'why' for a Bi-cultural journey in preparation to welcome Tennis NZ's first Māori Appointed Board Member in December 2025.

SPORT HAS THE POWER TO CONNECT COMMUNITIES AND WE WANT TO SHOW LEADERSHIP IN TAKING A BI-CULTURAL APPROACH FOR **GREATER INCLUSION AND REPRESENTATION** OR ALL IN THE TENNIS COMMUNITY.

Due to a challenging year financially with TAB returns, the Audit and Risk Committee has maintained monthly oversight of the Tennis NZ financials.

Cost saving measures were put in place to limit the deficit, including the use of online Board meetings and the May 2025 National Governance Forum.

The uncertainty around this major revenue line imposes the need for ongoing vigilance and flexibility in the operational cost structure.

Tennis NZ thanks the external contributors to governance activities including the Transition Steering Group, Board Appointment Panel and Honours Selection Panel.

As decided by the Honours Selection Panel, Te Tohu Hāpai honours were conferred to seven further recipients for their lifetime contribution to tennis

We also thank 2024/2025 Honorary Vice President Glenn Black for his extensive service to tennis. Glenn was able to enjoy hospitality at The Championships, Wimbledon as well as attend the World Tennis Tour event in Timaru.

Final thanks go to the volunteer Tennis NZ Board members for their commitment to extra out-ofcycle meetings, committee and advisory work alongside the main Board meetings. In late 2024 we farewelled Marina Erakovic to embrace motherhood.

After two rounds of search, former Olympian and Commonwealth Games athlete Sarah Cowley Ross was appointed.

Sarah has previously served on the NZOC Board as Chair of the Athlete's Commission. Tennis NZ was delighted to welcome Sarah with her fresh perspectives on elite athlete pathways, governance experience and communications expertise.

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Tennis New Zealand Incorporated For the year ended 30 June 2025

1. Reporting Entity

The reporting entity is Tennis New Zealand Incorporated ("Tennis NZ"). Tennis New Zealand Incorporated is domiciled in New Zealand and is a charitable organisation registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 2022 and the Charities Act 2005.

The financial statements of Tennis NZ are presented for the year ended 30 June 2025. These financial statements and the accompanying notes summarise the financial results of activities carried out by Tennis NZ which provides tennis sporting services and facilities to people living in the wider New Zealand area.

These financial statements have been approved and were authorised for issue by the Board on the 8 October 2025.

2. Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in New Zealand ("NZ GAAP"). They comply with Public Benefit Entity International Public Sector Accounting Standards ("PBE IPSAS") and other applicable financial reporting standards as appropriate that have been authorised for use by the External Reporting Board for Not-For-Profit entities. For the purposes of complying with NZ GAAP, Tennis NZ is a public benefit not-for-profit entity and is eligible to apply PBE IPSAS RDR on the basis that it does not have public accountability and it is not defined as large. The Board has elected to report in accordance with PBE Accounting Standards RDR.

3. Significant Accounting Policies

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation of these financial statements as set out below have been applied consistently to both years presented in these financial statements.

3.1 Basis of Measurement

These financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost, as modified by the fair value measurement of non-derivative financial instruments.

3.2 Functional and Presentational Currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars (\$), which is Tennis NZ's functional currency. All financial information presented in New Zealand dollars has been rounded to the nearest dollar.

3.3 Revenue

Donations

Donations are recognised as revenue upon receipt and include any donations from the general public, or donations received for specific programmes or services.

Grant Revenue

Grant revenue includes grants given by other charitable organisations, philanthropic organisations and businesses. Grant revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attaching to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to revenue as the conditions are fulfilled.

TAB Revenue

The TAB revenue is from commission on tennis betting and is recognised as revenue when entitled to be received.

3.3.1 Revenue Recognition from non-exchange transactions

Non-exchange transactions are those where the Group receives an inflow of resources (i.e. cash and other tangible or intangible items) but provides no (or nominal) direct consideration in return.

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognised as assets are recognised as non-exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognised in respect to the same inflow.

Liabilities are recognised in relation to inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transactions, where both:

- It is probable that an outflow of resources embodying future economic benefit or service potential will be required to settle the obligation, and
- The amount of the obligation can be reliably estimated.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to the Group's non-exchange transaction revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

3.3.2 Revenue from exchange transactions

Revenue from exchange transactions, including goods and services received in kind is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the Group and revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received.

Affiliation Fees

Affiliation fees received are initially recorded as income in advance and recognised in revenue evenly over the membership period.

Where coaches purchase specific services (for example, attendance at coaching and development courses), revenue is initially recorded as income in advance, and then recognised proportionally on the basis of the value of each session relative to the total value of the purchased services.

Interest Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest method.

Events and Tournaments

Income generated directly from ASB Classic. Revenue is recognised when it is either invoiced or when payment is made whichever is the earlier.

3.4 Financial Instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when Tennis NZ becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Tennis NZ derecognises a financial asset or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets when the rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired or are waived, or Tennis NZ has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party; and either:

- Tennis NZ has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset; or
- Tennis NZ has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

Financial Assets

Financial assets within the scope of PBE IPSAS 29 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement are classified as financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit, loans and receivables, held-to-maturity investments or available-for-sale financial assets. The classifications of the financial assets are determined at initial recognition.

Loans and Receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for impairment. Tennis NZ's cash and cash equivalents, short-term investments, receivables from non-exchange transactions, receivables from exchange transactions and non-equity investments fall into this category of financial instruments.

Impairment of Financial Assets

A financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired and impairment losses are incurred if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset (a 'loss event') and that loss event has an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset or the group of financial assets that can be reliably estimated.

For financial assets carried at amortised cost, if there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on loans and receivables carried at amortised cost has been incurred, the amount of the loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cashflows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate. The carrying amount of the asset is reduced through the use of an allowance account. The amount of the loss is recognised in the surplus or deficit for the reporting period.

If in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed by adjusting the allowance account. If the reversal results in the carrying amount exceeding its amortised cost, the amount of the reversal is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Financial Liabilities

Tennis NZ's financial liabilities include trade and other creditors (excluding GST and PAYE), employee entitlements and deferred income (in respect to grants whose conditions are yet to be complied with).

All financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value (plus transaction cost for financial liabilities not at fair value through surplus or deficit) and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

3.5 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

3.6 Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset.

Depreciation is charged on a straight-line basis over the useful life of the asset. Depreciation is charged at rates calculated to allocate the cost or valuation of the asset less any estimated residual value over its remaining useful life:

- Sporting equipment 3 years
- Office furniture / equipment 5 years
- Computer equipment / software 3 years
- ASB Classic Tournament Assets 3 15 years

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and are adjusted if there is a change in the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits or service potential embodied in the asset.

3.7 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. The cost of intangible assets acquired in a non-exchange transaction is their fair value at the date of the exchange.

Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

The useful lives of intangible assets are assessed as either finite or indefinite. Intangible assets with finite lives are amortised over the useful economic life and assessed for impairment whenever there is an indication that the intangible asset may be impaired. A review is made at least at the end of each financial period.

The amortisation expense on intangible assets with finite lives is recognised in surplus or deficit as the expense category that is consistent with the function of the intangible assets. Tennis NZ currently holds a Customer Relationship Management (CRM) System as an intangible asset, with an amortisation period of 6 years.

3.8 Employee Benefits

Wages, Salaries and Annual Leave

Liabilities for wages, salaries and annual leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

3.9 Income Tax

Due to its charitable status, Tennis NZ is exempt from income tax.

3.10 Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except for receivables and payables, which are stated with the amount of GST included.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is classified as part of operating cash flows.

3.11 Equity

Equity is the members interest in Tennis NZ, measured as the difference between total assets and total liabilities. Equity is made up of the following component:

Accumulated comprehensive income and expenses. This is Tennis NZ's accumulated surplus or deficit since its formation, adjusted for transfers to/from specific reserves.

3.12 Financial Accounting Standards

There were no new PBE IPSAS RDR standards that became effective in the current year that have an impact upon the Tennis NZ financial accounts.

4. Significant Accounting Judgements, Estimates and Assumptions

The preparation of Tennis NZ's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, including the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future periods.

Judgements

In the process of applying Tennis NZ's accounting policies, management has made the following judgements, which have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

Use of Going Concern

The view of the Directors, is that Tennis NZ have sufficient resources to enable it to meet its obligations as and when they fall due and therefore continue to adopt the use of the going concern assumption in the preparation of the financial statements.

Operating Lease Commitments

Leases in terms of which Tennis NZ does not retain all the significant risks and rewards of ownership, are accounted for as operating leases.

Operating lease rentals are recognised evenly over the expected period of the benefit to the organisation. In the event that lease incentives are received to enter into operating leases, such incentives are initially recorded as a liability and are recognised as a reduction of rental expense on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

Estimates and Assumptions

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. Tennis NZ based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, however, may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of Tennis NZ. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they

Useful Lives and Residual Values

The useful lives and residual values of assets are assessed using the following indicators to determine potential future use and value from disposal:

The condition of the asset

- The nature of the asset, its susceptibility and adaptability to changes in technology and processes
- The nature of the processes in which the asset is deployed
- Availability of funding to replace the asset
- Changes in the market in relation to the asset.

The estimated useful lives of the asset classes held by Tennis NZ are listed in Note 3.6.

5. Changes in accounting policy

PBE IPSAS 1

PBE IPSAS 1 Presentation of Financial Reports - Amendment Disclosure of Fees for Audit Firms' Services is effective for accounting periods on or after the 1 January 2024 and has been applied by Tennis NZ as at 1 July 2024.

PBE IPSAS 1 requires an entity to describe the services provided by its audit or review firm and to disclose the fees incurred by the entity for those services using prescribed categories

6. Joint Arrangement

Tennis NZ is a party to a joint arrangement where there is a contractual arrangement that confers joint control over relevant activities of the arrangement to Tennis NZ and Tennis Auckland Region Incorporated ("Tennis Auckland"). Joint control is assessed under the same principles as a controlled entity subsidiary.

This arrangement was updated for the 2025 ASB Classic event with Tennis NZ apportionment decreasing from 50% to 33%. Refer to note 23.

Tennis NZ classifies its interests in the joint arrangement as jointly controlled operations. Tennis NZ has both the rights to assets and obligations for liabilities of the joint arrangement.

In assessing the classification of interests in jointly controlled operation Tennis NZ considers:

- The structure of the joint arrangement
- The legal form of the joint arrangement
- The contractual terms of the joint arrangement
- Any other facts and circumstances.

Each party account for its interests in the jointly controlled operation in the same manner as investments using the consolidation method.

Tennis NZ accounts for its interests in the jointly controlled operation by recognising its share of assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses in accordance with its contractually conferred rights and obligations. In accordance with PBE IPSAS 37 Joint Arrangements, Tennis NZ is required to apply all of the principles of PBE IPSAS 40 Business Combinations when it acquires an interest in a joint operation that constitutes a business as defined by PBE IPSAS 40

Judgement

For all joint arrangements structured in separate vehicles Tennis NZ must assess the substance of the joint arrangement in determining whether it is classified as a joint venture or joint operation. This assessment requires Tennis NZ to consider whether it has rights to the joint arrangement's net assets (in which case it is classified as a joint venture), or rights to and obligations for specific assets, liabilities, expenses, and revenues (in which case it is classified as a joint operation).

Factors Tennis NZ must consider include:

- Structure
- Legal form
- Contractual agreement
- Other facts and circumstances.

Upon consideration of these factors, Tennis NZ has determined that all of its joint arrangements is not structured through a separate vehicle which gives rights to the assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses and are therefore classified as joint operation.

(a) Joint Operation

Tennis New Zealand held joint interest over the following joint arrangements during the 2025 year, all of which is accounted for under the joint operation treatment whereby if gives rights to assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses.

On 1 July 2024 this arrangement was updated for the 2025 ASB Classic event with Tennis NZ apportionment decreasing from 50% to 33%.

The ASB Classic is a event that has not been incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act.
On 1 July 2024 it disposed of a 17% ownership interest in The ASB Classic, resulting in Tennis New Zealand retaining a 33% interest.

23. Prior Period Adjustments

Significant judgement: ASB Classic is a Joint Arrangement, in the form of a Joint Operation. An entity has majority oversight over another entity only if it has all of the following attributes:

- Power over the other entity
- Exposure to, or rights to, variable benefits from it involvement with the other entity
- -The ability to use its power over the other entity to affect the nature or amount of the benefits from its involvement with the other entity

The ASB Classic agreement executed in the 2023 financial year established joint 50/50 financial interest between Tennis NZ and Tennis Auckland. Key decisions required approval from both parties. This agreement governed the operations for the 2023 and 2024 ASB Classic Tournament. In this agreement the surplus generated from the joint operation would be shared equally between both parties.

In the 2025 Financial year a new agreement was executed outlining that the surplus or shortfall will be split between the two parties with 67% of the result attributed or recoverable from Tennis Auckland and the remaining 33% attributed or recoverable from Tennis NZ.

During the current year under audit the arrangements activities between Tennis Auckland and Tennis NZ are focused on providing the two parties with an output, therefore the arrangement is classified a Joint Operation rather than a Joint Venture due to the ASB Classic arrangement not meeting the definition of a separate vehicle under the relevant accounting standard.

Previously the share of profit from the ASB classic was brought into the Statement of Comprehensive income as a separate line item, "Share of Equity Accounted Investees Surplus/(Deficit)" as per PBE IPSAS 37 under the Joint Venture classification stating that Tennis NZ has rights to the net assets of the joint arrangement.

The initial investment inclusive of net surplus was recognised on the statement of performance as a single line item "Equity Accounted Investees: ASB Classic Joint Venture".

During the 2025 financial year a significant judgment determined that the Joint Arrangement known as the ASB Classic should be classified as a Joint Operation. The change in the accounting treatment required a restatement of the 2024 financial year. This restatement concluded that 50% of all income, expenses, assets and liabilities of the joint operation should be included in the financial statements in the correct classification of Tennis NZ.

In the tables below we identify the 2024 financial results as previously published and audited together with the adjustments due to the change in accounting treatment. The change has not resulted in any change in the net result of the Statement of Comprehensive Revenue and Expenses.

The change has resulted in the removal of the investment in the joint arrangement on the Statement of Financial Position, and the incorporation as shown of it's assets and liabilities in the total balances of Tennis NZ.
